Land Acknowledgement

We acknowledge that our university is located on the ancestral homelands of sovereign Native nations, including the Tequesta, the Calusa, and today, the Seminole Tribe of Florida, and the Miccosukee Tribe of Indians of Florida. We pay our respects to the traditional custodians, the Elders past and present, by fully recognizing Indigenous sovereignty as well as the historical and contemporary relationship between Indigenous peoples and their traditional homelands. It is within our responsibility as an academic institution to uphold knowledge about the history of our institution with the original stewards of this land that we live, learn, and work on. Keynote Speakers

DR. ANTHONY W. PEREIRA



Anthony W. Pereira is the Director of the Kimberly Green Latin American and Caribbean Center and a Professor in the Department of Politics and International Relations at Florida International University. Previously, he was the founding director of the Brazil Institute at King's College London (2010-2020) and later a professor in the School of Global Affairs. His research focuses on authoritarianism, democracy, human rights, public security, environmental issues, and Latin American international relations. He holds degrees from Sussex University (B.A.) and Harvard University (M.A., Ph.D.). Pereira has taught at institutions including the New School for Social Research, Tufts, Tulane, and the University of East Anglia. He has received Fulbright fellowships and grants from FAPESP, the British Academy, and the Mellon Foundation. His books alyzing Brazil's history (Modern Brazil), right-wing authoritarianism (Right-Wing Authoritarianism Within and Beyond Latin America), comparative authoritarian rule (Political Injustice), and contemporary Brazilian society (Understanding Contemporary Brazil). His research appears in leading journals on Latin American politics.

DR. MOHAMED K. GHUMRAWI



Dr. Mohamed K. Ghumrawi holds a Ph.D. in International Relations (2022) and an M.A. in International Studies (2017). He is Assistant Director of the Mohsin and Fauzia Jaffer Center for Muslim World Studies at FIU and faculty director of the FIU Model UN program. He founded the "FIU in the Middle East" study abroad program and serves on the Board of the Jerusalem Peace Institute. An adjunct professor in Politics and International Relations, his research focuses in politics and IR of the Middle East, with specific expertise on the Palestinian diaspora and Palestinian-Israeli relations. He also teaches and conducts research in multiple subfields of IR and political science, including strategic studies, national security studies, and the intersectionality of social and human rights movements globally, as well as race and ethnic politics. His publications cover Islamophobia and Muslim-Jewish relations, including *Muslims and Jews in 7th Century Jerusalem* (2016) and *Muslim-Sephardi Relations* (2014).



Awards Breakdown

At FIMUN, we believe in a transparent award distribution. Below is the standard that we use at FIMUN to determine individual and delegation awards.

Individual awards:

Our policy is to award delegates who show constructive leadership, exhibit knowledge on the topics at hand, maintain country or position policy, and positively affect committee as a whole. We do not award delegates whose "leadership styles" include any form of bullying or intimidation tactics. We have a very strict anti- bullying policy and will report any such instances to delegation sponsors to determine the proper course of action.

In our general assembly committees, specialized committees, and crisis committees award number will be determined by the size of the committee. However, only one Best Delegate award will be given in each committee. A special exception is the Ad-Hoc, which will have three Best Delegate Awards and multiple Diplomatic Commendations.

Best Delegate – 5 points

Outstanding Delegate – 4 points

Honorable Mention – 3 point

Diplomatic Commendation – 2 points

Delegation awards:

Delegation awards are split into two categories: small delegations and large delegations. Every year we determine the "cut- off" for small delegations by finding the median number of delegates from all delegations registered and we do our best to ensure that the small-to-large delegation ratio is roughly 50%-50%. This year, the median number of delegates is 15. Therefore, for this year's delegation awards, in order to be considered a small delegation, you must have a total delegate count of 14 or fewer. In order to be considered a large delegation, you must have a total delegate count of 15 or more.

In calculating the delegation awards, we determine the winners of best and outstanding large and small delegation awards through a ratio system. To simplify it, we divide the total points that a delegation received by the number of committees assigned to the delegation, so dual- delegation committees count as one. The delegation with the best overall ratio of points- to- committees wins best large, and so on.
